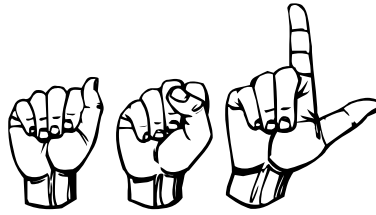

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About American Sign Language

American Sign Language (ASL) is a natural language, which may be received visually or through touch. ASL is the primary language of North Americans who are Deaf, but there are many other signed languages used throughout the world. ASL originated around 200 years ago through the mixing of sign language indigenous to the United States and French Sign Language. ASL is conveyed through hand and body movements, and facial expressions, and has its own grammar, syntax, and vocabulary, which are separate from English.

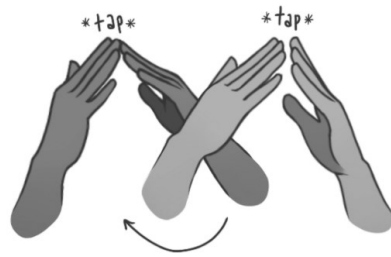

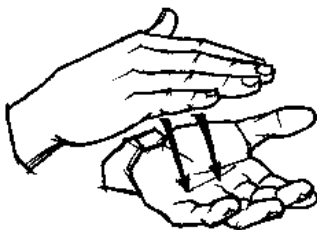

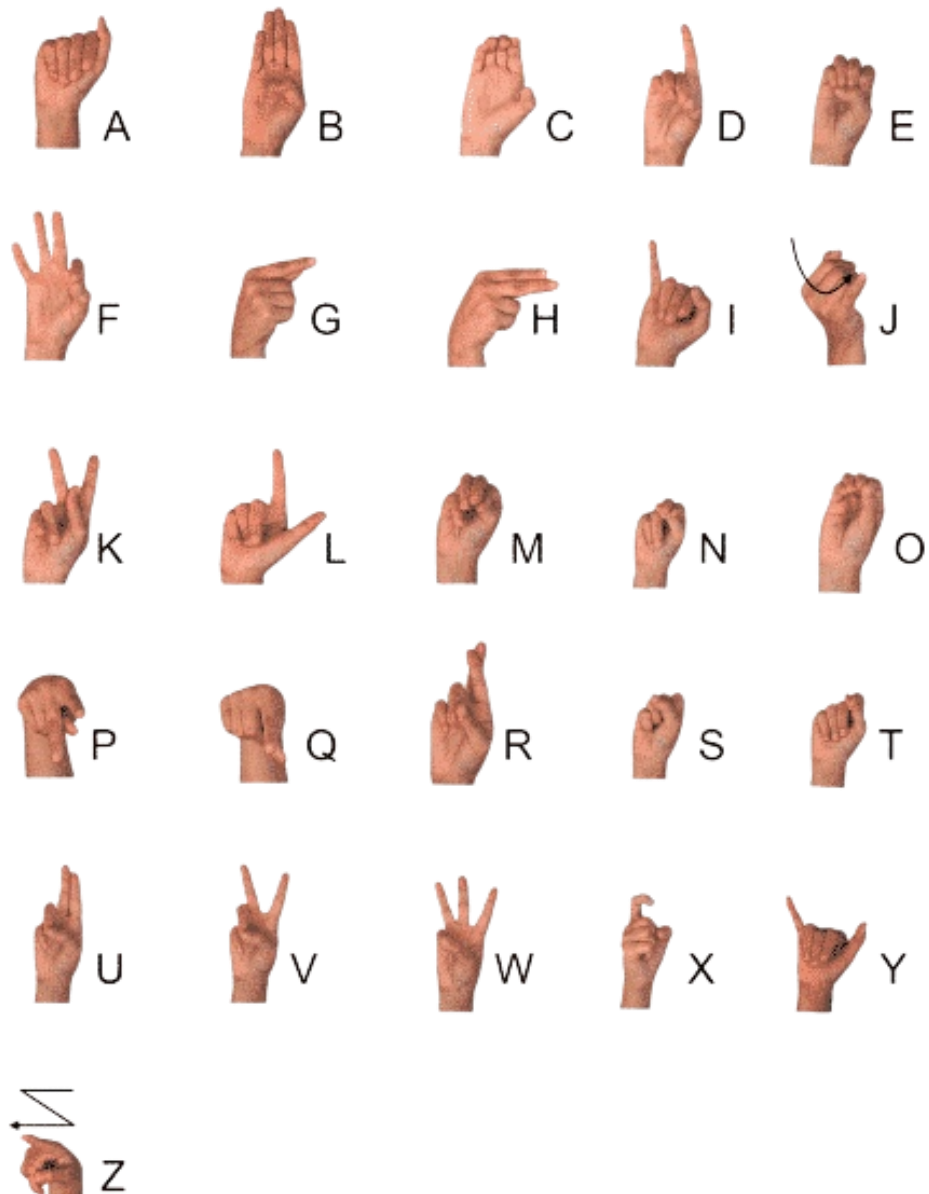
