Virginia Relay Encourages Users to Complete a Relay Choice Profile

If you are deaf, hard-of-hearing or have difficulty speaking and use Virginia Relay's services to communicate over the telephone, Virginia Relay encourages you to complete your personal Relay Choice Profile. Filling out this free, simple form will help us make sure every relay call you make and receive is as individual as you are. By having a Relay Choice Profile, our Communications Assistants (CA) will always automatically know your communications preferences, allowing us to relay your call more quickly.

The easiest way to complete your customer profile is to visit our website www.varelay.org. All of your information will be kept confidential, and you will be asked to create a password to prevent others from changing your information without your permission. If you have more than one relay user living in your household, Multi-User Relay Choice Profiles are available so that each person may select their own preferences.

Your customer profile allows you to select your preferred way to both connect to relay and receive relay calls. Your choices include: Text Telephone (TTY), Voice Carry Over (VCO), 2-Line VCO, Hearing Carry Over (HCO), Speech to Speech (STS), STS with video assist or Voice. If you live with a person who uses relay differently than you, each of you can create your own profile.

You are also able to select your long distance company, designate other special features for your calls including ASL/English call translation and reduced speed text read-out, as well as establish a speed dial list of people you call frequently. Your profile will also allow you to choose how you would like the CA to greet the person you are calling on all of your relay calls.

Irene is a passionate individual who devotes her time and effort to supporting children with hearing loss and their families. She works tirelessly to provide emotional and informational support to ensure that families are aware of the services offered by Virginia's early intervention system.

She is actively involved in Guide By Your Side (GBYS), a program offered through the Virginia Commonwealth University, that supports families with children who have hearing loss. She became a Family Guide in 2007 and has served as Program Coordinator since 2012. Since her involvement with GBYS, Irene has been instrumental in key efforts, including; publicizing the works of the program to increase referrals, recruiting parents to serve as Family Guides, developing a resource guide for families, representing families at meetings and advisory councils, organizing Meet & Greets and more.

Additionally, Irene devotes her knowledge and talents to a number of other organizations, including the Virginia Network of Consultants, Virginia Commonwealth University, the Virginia Department of Education, Fairfax Public Schools, George Washington University, University of Maryland, the National Summit of Deaf Education and Hands & Voices.

The Virginia School for the Deaf and the Blind (VSDB) is offering K-12 public school students with vision loss, hearing loss, and who are Deaf-Blind the opportunity to spend one week on VSDB's campus under the direct care of the school and residential staff.

Available three times throughout the school year, The Extra Mile Program (TEMP) allows these students to experience a residential program and a signing environment, practice using specialized technology, as well as share a positive academic and social experience with peers and teachers who are experiencing

life with similar disabilities. During each TEMP week, visiting students follow lesson plans sent by the public school teachers and work on additional Individual Education Program goals.

Each year during Deaf Awareness Week, Hamilton Relay recognizes a community leader who is deaf or deaf-blind and has been a strong influence within their community and/or the commonwealth of Virginia, and who is committed to enhancing the lives of those around them. The 2013 recipient of Virginia's Deaf Community Leader Award is Brenda Estes, a contracted VDDHH/Virginia Relay Outreach Specialist at the Endependence Center, Inc. in Norfolk.

Brenda Estes continues to be a pioneer, innovator, mentor, leader and tireless advocate for individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing. After fighting to overcome her own personal challenges, Brenda was inspired to advocate for others, ensuring that individuals with hearing loss know their rights and how to access appropriate accommodations.

Brenda has been involved with numerous associations, organizations, clubs and activities throughout Virginia. Through her work at the Endependence Center, she assists individuals with captioned telephones and assistive devices. A longtime member of the Association of Late Deafened Adults (ALDA), Brenda has served as the secretary, president elect and president of the organization. She was on the planning committee for the ALDA International Convention and had the opportunity to be host of a previous convention.

Brenda served as the 2013 vice president for the Virginia Beach chapter of the Hearing Loss Association of America (HLAA) and served two terms as president for the Virginia Beach chapter of Self Help for Hard of Hearing (SHHH). She was a member of the advisory boards for Southeastern Virginia Society of the Deaf, the Tidewater Community College American Sign Language (ASL) program and the Virginia Relay Advisory Council. Furthermore, Brenda served on committees for the ALDA & TDI 2013 Joint Conference, and as a committee member and consultant for the Virginia Association of the Deaf Conference.

In addition, Brenda has been involved with the Virginia Beach City Public School for the Deaf/HOH Task Force, the Northern Virginia Community Roundtable for Deaf and Hard of Hearing and has been an SHHH Mentor for children between the ages of 10-14.

Highly acclaimed by her peers, Brenda is described as a compassionate, humble and down-to-earth leader who relates well with others and communicates effectively.
