Technology Assistance Program Provides Telecommunication Equipment & Assistive Technology

Do you find yourself sleeping through your alarm clock for work? Or find yourself missing some of your phone calls? Do you struggle hearing over the phone? We've got you covered!

The Technology Assistance Program (TAP) offers specialized telecommunications equipment and assistive technology to Virginia Residents who are deaf, hard of hearing, have a combination of hearing and vision loss or have speech difficulties. Some of the available devices include amplified telephones, captioned telephones, personal amplification devices and various signalers.

With several devices available through TAP, VDDHH offers training on the devices as well as a 30-day trial period where qualified applicants can decide whether to keep, exchange or return the equipment. If you are satisfied with the device, it becomes yours to own. Applicants can re-apply for additional equipment every four years allowing them to always have access to the latest updated technology available.

Being committed to continually providing ways to assist those individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing, Virginia Veterans automatically qualify for TAP equipment at no cost upon providing qualification information.

FCC Cracks Down on Illegal Robocall Traffic

On October 3, 2022, the FCC announced its plan to remove companies from the agency's **Robocall Mitigation Database** for violating the databases rules, ultimately restricting their access to make calls until they prove their compliance with the FCC. The FCC requires that all providers certify in the Robocall Mitigation Database that they have fully implemented STIR/SHAKEN or have instituted a robocall mitigation program by June 30, 2023 to ensure that they are not originating illegal robocalls.

This technology protects Americans from scams where inaccurate Caller ID information is displayed making call receivers believe the call is from a legitimate source. The FCC's call authentication program prevents unauthorized robocalls from passing through the complex web of networks.

The FCC recently notified seven voice service providers operating in the US that they are not meeting the requirements and are at risk of being removed. FCC Chairwoman Jessica Rosenworcel:

"This is a new era. If a provider doesn't meet its obligations under the law, it now faces expulsion from America's phone networks. Fines alone aren't enough. Providers that don't follow our rules and make it easy to scam consumers will now face swift consequences." The FCC has made it very clear that this is a serious topic of discussion, and it values the privacy of Americans. Taking what may sound like extreme measures is necessary to continue this protection.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 Cups oil for frying
- ¹/₄ Cup onion, chopped
- 10 (6-inch) corn tortillas, torn into strips
- 6 eggs

DIRECTIONS

1. In a large, heavy skillet, heat the oil to 350 degrees. Carefully stir in the onion and tortilla strips. Fry until tortilla strips are crisp and golden.

2 tsp. salt

1/2 Cup water

tomato sauce

Jack cheese

- 2. Remove from oil and drain on paper towels. Drain the skillet, leaving only a thin layer of oil.
- 3. Over medium heat, return tortillas to the skillet and stir in the eggs. Season with salt. Cook and stir until eggs are firm.
- Mix Mexican style hot tomato sauce and water into the skillet. Reduce heat and simmer until thickened, about 10 minutes. Top with cheese and enjoy!
